Christmas Revealed

They had heard his voice for centuries. Now they heard his cries from a manger and his babbling voice from his mother's arms. God is with us. God came to dwell among us. The Great High Priest with his lowly birth in Bethlehem. The Ancient of Days on his first day as a human outside the womb. The Holy One came to eat and drink with sinners. The



Word made flesh keeping his promises from of old. We have no record of the apostle John being present at the first Christmas. But even from exile on Patmos, John could say, "Immanuel. God is with us."

Revelation 1¹² I turned around to see the voice that was speaking to me. And when I turned I saw seven golden lampstands, ¹³ and among the lampstands was someone like a son of man, dressed in a robe reaching down to his feet and with a nd, Jesus would never run off from his churches. His sash is reminiscent of a priest. Jesus was sacrificed once for all sin of all people. Since he humbled himself to death on the crogolden sash around his chest. ¹⁴ The hair on his head was white like wool, as white as snow, and his eyes were like blazing fire. ¹⁵ His feet were like bronze glowing in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of rushing waters. ¹⁶ In his right hand he held seven stars, and coming out of his mouth was a sharp, double-edged sword. His face was like the sun shining in all its brilliance.

The seven lampstands were the churches to whom Jesus wanted letters to be written. Jesus' disciples, whether they gather in exile or in a major urban area, are the light of the world, will continue to shine their good deeds before others so that their Father in heaven may be glorified. John saw among the lampstands someone like a son of man. This was Jesus himself, God with us. Even though the rest of the apostles had already finished their race and John was not far behiss in this way, he is now exalted. He appears in glory as the eternal, holy ruler. Nothing is hidden from his eyes and he is poised to exact justice on behalf of his people. All things are under his feet as he rules over heaven and earth for the good of his church. His voice, mightier than a roaring river, made light shine out of darkness and healed the lame, forgave sins and even gave life to the dead. He holds in his powerful right hand those called to speak his words and lead many people to righteousness. They will shine like stars. They wield the sword of his Word, which penetrates the soul and judges the attitudes of the heart. Jesus' face still shines like the sun, just as on the mount of transfiguration where the Father said, "Listen to him!"

Many people experience loneliness this time of year. We are never alone! God is with us: Immanuel. Many people are lost in darkness this time of year. They have light in us! Shine with the light reflected from our Savior's face. Many people use holiday celebrations as an excuse for excess and abuse. We have forgiveness in our Great High Priest, Jesus! As the world looks more hostile to each other and to Christianity, we have the blazing eyes of the King of kings looking out for us. Just as he came on the first Christmas and was there on Patmos, Immanuel is here among us. God is with us!

School Board Report

- Voted to compensate teachers additional wages for the hours they are doing teachers aide work
- Capacities were set for 3k-K
 - 3K is 18 children
 - 4k is 20 children
 - K is 20 children
- All 3 require 2 adults and we need 2 adults for wrap around care 11:30am-3:30pm
- New tuition rates approved for 3k and 4k as follows
 - 5 days a week, full days \$5000 for year ½ days \$2500
 - 4 days a week, full days \$4000 for year $\frac{1}{2}$ days \$2000
 - 3 days a week full days \$3000 for year $\frac{1}{2}$ days \$1500
 - 2 days a week ½ days only \$1000 for year
- Pre K enrollment for members will begin December 10th. There is a 3 ½ year waiting list.

Treasurer Report

Financial Results to Budget

<u>Revenue</u>

Offerings for the month of November (4 Sundays & Thanksgiving) totaled \$65,200 (averaging \$16,300 per week) up from October (5 Sundays), totaled \$91,400 (averaging \$18,300 per week and compared to last year November-2022 (4 Sundays) totaled \$57,600.

\$18,900 in tuition was received in November. \$8,000 of K-8 tuition, \$9,000 K3 & K4 tuition and Support form our sister congregations \$1,500 from St John/ St. Peter-Cleveland and \$417 monthly from Calvary-Sheboygan. A second of four quarterly School Choice payments for \$71,900 was received this month.

Special donations received in November were:

- We received an additional \$22,300 for Growing Forward.
- \$550 for Faith for the Future.
- \$250 for the School Fund
- \$251 for the Church directory

<u>Expenses</u>

<u>Church Expenses</u> are under budget as medical expenses and music/worship supplies are running under budget.

<u>School expenses</u> for medical insurance is also under budget. This is being offset by more hours and higher wages for School Aides and extra Hot Lunch Helper. We are seeing higher expenses for textbooks and supplies with the startup of school. \$8,760.65 of PTF funds have been assigned to offset some of the textbook expenses. The first two School Choice Audits were completed and billed so far this year resulting in higher cost than budget.

<u>Property / shared expenses:</u> With the added school space, custodian wages are running higher than budget.

We are still seeing lower utility costs so far. With a new electrical connection, we are on a different billing rate than last year.

<u>Missions:</u> Monthly payments to WELS and MLHS were made to budgeted amounts. Two month's Interest expense on the Oostburg Bank loan has being charged to the operating budget as the project is completed. The original budget has 5 months planned.

The Net Results of the operating (Budgeted) funds is a slight profit of \$676, compared to a planned (\$12,871) loss.

Building Expansion:

A final construction bill of \$47,341 will be paid in December as all construction issues are settled. Construction borrowing remains at \$2,989,531.

At the end of November, outstanding pledges for Growing Forward stand at \$247,900.

Trustee's Report

The big stainless refrigerator in the kitchen is having issues. We are working through them. Hopefully with the installation of a new thermostat we can have it running well again. With that we are reaching out for quotes for a new one. We know that this refrigerator is important for serving lunches and are trying to move things along as fast as possible.

We are having issues with losing water in the new fire pump water tank underground. We have been in contact with Quasius, Korf Plumbing, and Complete Fire Service. Complete Fire Service will be out to do some work on it and then we will need to do some further monitoring to be sure we do not have a leak in the tank. More to come.

If there is anyone that has any bigger project ideas, please bring them forward to one of the Trustee's. We are keeping a list of future budget needs and are always open to any new idea's members may have.

WELS Report

Conference of Presidents meeting 2023

The Conference of Presidents (COP) held its fall meeting on October 3–5. Here is a summary of the matters discussed and decided:

• The COP has begun to carry out a <u>resolution</u> of the synod convention asking for a pastoral brief on the subject of critical theories and justice, issues that are confronting pastors and members in our society today. A pastoral brief is a statement that will provide information and guidance on a specific subject. It is "pastoral" not because it is intended only for pastors, but because the guidance it provides is biblical, evangelical, and pastoral.

• The COP was informed that a task force to address the called worker shortage will be appointed in the coming weeks, as directed by the <u>synod convention</u>. The task force will craft recommendations for a synod wide effort to increase the number of candidates for the public ministry.

• The COP approved a proposal to extend and encourage WELS teaching ministry certification for all early childhood teachers, whether called or hired. The COP also approved a proposal that makes a distinction between synod wide early childhood teacher certification (meaning that such certified teachers are able to be called anywhere) and local teacher certification, which certifies early childhood teachers for service in their own local congregation only.

• The COP is asking the Synodical Council's Compensation Review Committee to propose an appropriate manner of compensating directors and teachers for increased time commitments and responsibilities involved in early childhood education.

WELS Report

- •The Early Childhood Ministry Support Task Force is producing a document as a resource for early childhood education (ECE) leaders, boards, district coordinators, and district presidents to build awareness and give strategies on how to efficiently operate an ECE program while meeting the needs of ECE staff, parents, and children.
- •The COP continues to look at ways to improve the guidelines and procedures dealing with the call system.

•The COP extended a call to Rev. Michael Hatzung to serve as a Christian giving counselor in a half-time retirement call. In view of the pastoral shortage, the COP also considered filling a full-time vacant Christian giving counselor position and determined that this call, if possible, should be extended to a qualified layman rather than to a pastor. A notice for <u>nominations for this position</u> was issued last week.

- •The COP received reports from the Ministry of Christian Giving, the Commission on Congregational Services, and Communication Services, and was updated on the processes for gathering congregational statistics and Congregation Mission Offering subscriptions.
- •The COP is continuing its work on finalizing the restatement of the synod's doctrinal position on male-female roles and relationships.

MLHS Report

 - Pastor Jason Hacker is transitioning into his role as MLHS President.
 - Pastor Brett Krause from Denver, CO, declined the call on November 29 to teach theology at MLHS. MLHS is hoping to call again on December 5.
 - Matthew Meitner from LaCrosse, WI was called on November 13 to teach English, ESL, and be assistant international coordinator.
 - Carrie Ungemach, who currently serves at First German in Manitowoc, was called on November 13 to teach art, foods, and photography. She has accepted that call.
