### Pastor's Message

#### Remember the Past

Benedict Arnold was a distinguished member of the Continental Army in the 1770s. He was smart and brave, helping win several victories for the Americans, even being promoted to major general. Yet he did not feel appreciated by the Continental Congress. After he married into a Loyalist family from Philadelphia, his wife kept him connected to a British officer, Major John Andre, by relaying messages between the two men. Together they plotted to surrender the American stronghold of West Point to the British.

There are many ways to win a war, and the devil will stop at nothing to take down strongholds in God's kingdom. John wrote to the church in Pergamum: **Revelation 2** <sup>14</sup> Nevertheless, I have a few things against you: There are some among you who hold to the teaching of Balaam, who taught Balak to entice the Israelites to sin so that they ate food sacrificed to idols and committed sexual immorality. <sup>15</sup> Likewise, you also have those who hold to the teaching of the Nicolaitans. <sup>16</sup> Repent therefore! Otherwise, I will soon come to you and will fight against them with the sword of my mouth. Balaam was a false prophet hired by Balak, a Moabite king, to curse the Israelites on their way to the Promised Land. The LORD only allowed Balaam to speak blessings on the Israelites. But Balaam did teach King Balak how to take the Israelites down from within, by having the Moabite women entice the Israelite men to idol worship, sexual immorality, and ultimately death. The LORD sent a plague that wiped out 24,000 Israelites who had yoked themselves to Baal. In Pergamum, it was being taught that idol worship and sexual immorality were acceptable and beneficial. Some Christians there latched onto that teaching. The Nicolaitans seem to be a group that promoted sinful living since Christians were forgiven anyway. Some Christians there followed that teaching as well. The devil was working from within to take down the church in Pergamum.

He does the same in churches today when it is taught that homosexuality is healthy, cohabitation is commendable, and sexual experimentation is encouraged. He infiltrates the church when sins such as filthy language, pornography usage, and other online impurity are left unaddressed. He breaches our defenses when we tolerate sins among believers because they are so prevalent in the world all around us. Don't surrender! Repent.

In 1780, American militiamen intercepted a letter and exposed the plot to surrender West Point. John Andre was hanged. The Lord says he will fight against those who hold to the teachings of Balaam and of the Nicolaitans. That is a fight that must end in death. In the end, no one can escape the sword that comes out of the Lord's mouth. So, put to death now the depravity that the Lord here condemns. Slay the immorality with which we've mingled. Point out sin in love and confess it from the heart. These are wrongs for which Christ was pierced and wickedness which his death has pardoned. Remember the past. History teaches us how devious the devil is but how his tactics always end in defeat. At the cross his head was crushed. On the Last Day he will be plunged into the lake of fire. Remember the one who holds history in his hands. Christ, whose Word is a sharp double-edged sword, was victorious over the grave. He who is, who was, and who is to come has written you into his story. That teaching we will hold onto for eternal salvation.

#### School Board Report

The Garden Gym Usage School Board and Elders have approved the proposal. Really comes down to insurance. Council gave the go-ahead to expand Garden Gym usage times on a trial basis in April and May.

Working on a Contingency plan in case School Choice goes away or if we choose to go away from School Choice. As of now we will address this issue if this happens, and will continue to discuss this issue. The School Board has been in contact with Mt Olive, Appleton for some help with this. Wrap around care and are running into deadend upon deadend, we really cannot find anyone to fill the position for wrap around care from 11:30-5:30 p.m.

Mr. Johnson's schedule could be a full time position with the administrative and intervention along with other duties as well. We received a covid grant which we use to help pay and this grant is going away. The intervention work that Mr. Johnson is doing is really important for our students.

#### **Treasurer Report**

Revenue

Offerings for the month of March (5 Sundays & 3 Lent services & Holy Week) totaled \$90,100 (averaging \$18,000 per week) down from February (4 Sundays & 3 Lent services), which totaled \$64,400 (averaging \$17,600 per week and compared to last year March-2023 (4 Sundays & 4 Lent services) totaled \$79,300. Year to date, offerings are running \$49,200 under budget. Tuition on the other hand is running \$23,000 over budget. Year to date total revenue is running \$17,500 under budget.

Special donations received in March were:

- We received an additional \$27,500 for Growing Forward.
- \$1,100 for the Youth Group.
- \$1,000 for the Michigan Lutheran Seminary Scholarship Fund
- \$250 for Faith for the Future.

Expenses from special funds were:

\$4,510 was paid for new church microphones from the AV Fund

\$1,000 was paid to Michigan Lutheran Seminary

A comparison of 9 months of the 23-24 budget year was compared to the same period for 22-23

- •Actual offerings were up 13% this year compared to a budget increase of 15%
- •Mission offerings to the WELS and MLHS are up 2% from last year and are following to the budget.
- Church expenses are down slightly in 23-24 compared to 22-23
- •School expenses are up 37 % from past year compared to a budget increase of 31%. The increase is mainly due to the addition of two full time teachers and 6 part-time aides. We also had higher expenses in equipping the new pre-school classrooms.
- •Property expenses are up 24% compared to a budget increase of 60%. The expanded building anticipated higher utility, property insurance and maintenance. Fortunately, these higher expenses were not incurred.
- •\$69,200 of interest was paid so far this year, compared to -0- as we had no debt for the construction period that fell in the 22-23 year. Ths \$69,200 is under the \$90,700 planned so far in 23-24

#### <u>Trustee's Report</u>

Bring back the arbor day cleanup on April 27th with rain day May 4th.

Planning to pour more of the concrete driveway out the back door and regrade some of the grass area to get better drainage. Approximately \$5000 for this work.

Quote from Poblocki Paving for repairs to fix the Parking lot is going to be \$25,000 from Poblocki. \$12,000 to seal coat and fix the Western 2/3's of the lot. \$13,000 to fix the major broken out issues on the South East end. Have something in this year's budget and possibly roll into next year's budget to take care of the parking lot repairs with Scrip funds and special appeal.

#### Supporting called workers

The Care Committee for Called Workers (CCCW), part of WELS Special Ministries, recently updated its materials. The CCCW exists to assist WELS calling bodies in the spiritual, physical, intellectual, and emotional care of their called workers. Its materials offer instructions on how to set up a congregational care committee as well as ways to help called workers financially prepare for retirement.

"While many calling bodies informally provide support to their workers, having an intentional, structured plan and organization makes sure workers are heard and encouraged," says Rev. Joel Gaertner, director of WELS Special Ministries. A congregational Care Committee for Called Workers can provide that structure so congregations can make sure their workers are cared for. St. John, Redwood Falls, Minn., has had a formal Care Committee for Called Workers for years, offering support to its 14 called workers and 2 support staff at its church and school. Five lay married couples form the committee, which is headed by Mr. Lance Otto, a member of the congregation's Board of Elders. Each couple is assigned three to four called workers with whom they meet regularly.

Otto says a couple from the committee is in contact with the called worker from the very beginning—right when the call is accepted. That connection continues with once-a-year formal visits and numerous check-ins throughout the year. "They're not just there to solve problems; they're there to be a supporter and encourager," says Otto. Having a contact couple also offers a safe place for called workers to share their concerns.

"Our Savior demonstrated a loving and caring heart for his disciples throughout his ministry. By his example, Jesus gave us a model of caring for our called workers. His command to love one another surely applies to Christians caring for the workers he sends us," says Gaertner. "A local CCCW is often the best way to accomplish this."

#### Groups addressing important issues

A number of groups have been carrying out their assignments to address various issues that are important to our called workers, congregations, and members. Here is an update on those groups and their assignments.

The Ministry Recruitment task force (already described more fully in a previous issue of Together) Chaired by Rev. Paul Prange, this task force was formed as a result of a resolution passed by the 2023 synod convention due to the significant shortage of pastors, teachers, and staff ministers. Its assignment is to look at all factors that impact the recruitment of called workers and bring recommendations for a synodwide effort to recruit and train more called workers. It will bring its recommendations to the 2025 synod convention.

#### Task force on critical theories

Chaired by Rev. Snowden Sims, this **task force** was assigned to evaluate the topic of critical theories and provide guidance to WELS called workers and members on how to understand and address these philosophies in light of Scripture. The task force will submit its recommendations to the Conference of Presidents, which will then produce and distribute a pastoral brief on the subject.

#### Theology curriculum task force

The theology curriculum task force is currently in an 18-month development of the components necessary for future content writers to create new instructional materials for WELS schools to use for the instruction of God's Word. The task force wants the new curriculum to hold fast to our purposes of sharing God's Word in its truth and purity with the next generation and meet the needs of increasingly diverse classrooms. One of its goals is to provide a curriculum that is primarily digital in format, which will make it possible to update the curriculum on an ongoing basis. The task force chairman is Mr. Jim Rademan. Mrs. Melanie Giddings is the curriculum coordinator.

#### Long-range strategic planning task force

Chaired by Rev. Jonathan Hein, this task force is developing a new synod long-range strategic plan that will guide all areas of synodical mission and ministry. The six-year plan, entitled "Christ through us" (the theme of the 2025 synod convention), will be presented to the synod convention in 2025.

#### 175th anniversary planning committee

Chaired by Prof. Joel Otto, the committee has already begun to make plans for the celebration of the synod's 175th anniversary in 2025. The theme for that celebration will be the same as the theme for the 2025 convention ("Christ through us"). Plans include a book that provides a pictorial history of the synod, video vignettes, an interactive online history of WELS, and a synodwide celebration Sunday in the fall of 2025.

#### Gender, sexuality, identity

A standing committee (not a temporary task force), chaired by Rev. Greg Lyon, is developing resources for pastors, congregations, parents, and young people to help them deal with transgender and same-sex attraction issues that are becoming more common in our society and culture.

#### Man/woman roles

The Conference of Presidents is continuing its work to develop a pastoral brief on man/woman roles. The brief will be distributed as soon as it is completed.

Unprinted Memorial (2023-04)

Subject: Artificial intelligence and the church

Floor Committee #2

WHEREAS 1) the development of and advances in Artificial Intelligence ("AI") technology are exponentially increasing on a daily basis; and

WHEREAS 2) the current AI models are based on language, the means by which God created the universe(Genesis 1:1) and became flesh (John 1:1); and

WHEREAS 3) researchers in the field of AI studies have raised concerns regarding the societal, moral, and ethical implications of the development of AI and its effect on human civilization; and WHEREAS 4) the Lord of the church has called God's people to be proactive in discerning what is good and evil (Hebrews 5:14); therefore be it Resolved,

a) that the synod in convention direct the Conference of Presidents to study by whatever means it deems most appropriate the development, implementation, and implications (societal,

theological, and ethical) of AI as it pertains to the ministry of the church; and be it Resolved,

b) that the synod in convention issue a moratorium on the use of language model AI to develop sermons, catechetical material, or other church-related content until the results of the Conference of Presidents' study be released; and be it finally Resolved,

c) that the Conference of Presidents make a preliminary report available to the district conventions in Report to the Twelve Districts in time for conventions in 2024.



#### Proposals

#### Proposals

• \$18,000 for a playground for the school for outside - this price doesn't include installation or base. There has been no school board approval yet. The system is rated for 2-12 years old. There are two pieces - the first one has a rock climber, 3 slides, etc. geared more toward little kids. The second piece is more of an obstacle course-type, geared more toward older kids. Zach Theobald suggests possibly \$3000 for the cement truck and mulch. If we split it up, first phase would be \$10,000 and second about \$8,000.

## Martin Grunewald-90

Martin Grunewald was born on April 7, 1934 to Martin and Elnora (Barts) Grunewald Sr., and grew up in Ada. The family home was located on the same property where Vintage of Ada now stands. He had three brothers: Milton, Merlin, and Norman - and one sister, Viola. Merlin is the only surviving sibling, living in Cleveland, and Martin and Merlin's children made sure that the two brothers were able to get together from time to time when their health permitted.

The family attended Trinity Church in Howards Grove and faith was an important part of family life. Martin's parents were farmers, having both animals and crops, and Martin developed a love of the outdoors.

Martin attended elementary school in Ada, and went on to Kiel High School. After graduating, he worked at Semph's grocery store in Ada, where he met his wife, Marilyn. Marilyn was a member of St. Paul's and they were married there on May 12, 1956. Martin joined the church at that time and he's been a member of St. Paul's ever since. They were blessed with 63 years of marriage before Marilyn's passing in October of 2019.

Martin and Marilyn's first home was an apartment in Millersville next to the old Fire Department. They had six children - all girls: Connie, Ruth, Donna, Amy, Diann and Jennifer. Growing up, they lovingly referred to Martin as the king of the house of queens. It was very important for Martin and Marilyn to pass down their faith, and all of the girls were baptized and confirmed at St. Paul's. With the exception of Ruth, who lives in Florida, the rest are still in the general area and they get together when possible, including this past Christmas. In all, Martin has eight grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

After the apartment in Millersville, the family moved to a home on Bittersweet Lane, where Martin's love of the outdoors continued. They received permission to plant a huge garden on the land behind their house which was owned by Badger Hatchery. The children have fond memories of planting potatoes on Mother's Day, and one year they dug up over 3000 pounds. The garden was so impressive that it won recognition in the Sheboygan Press.

Martin is a lifelong resident of the area and has a deep connection to it. A jack of all trades, he worked for many of the area's major employers, including Milwaukee Cheese Co., Kohler Co., Bitter-Neumann, Neumann Plumbing & Heating, and Piggy Wiggly. One of the family's favorite stories dates back to his time at Milwaukee Cheese, when Martin's mother requested that he bring home Limburger cheese. Although Martin hated the smell, he was not one to disappoint his mother, and he proved his resourcefulness by tying the cheese the bumper of his truck.

Although work kept him busy, he still managed to be handy around the house, building a deck onto the back, and the family has many fond memories from time spent there. They also added a three car garage, which gave them the extra space to let all those potatoes dry out

Martin was also very active in the the community, and when Millersville and Howard's Grove joined together, Martin was the Village's first treasurer in 1967. He also served for a time as Millersville's Fire Chief and was a member of the Millersville Recreation Association.

Martin currently lives at Harvest Home in Howards Grove, where he is surrounded by many family photographs, including an amazing portrait of the large extended family. It was very important to Marilyn to have it taken and Martin treasures it every day, still marveling at how amazing it was that they were all able to come together for it. Martin's daughters visit him regularly and Donna, who is also a member at St. Paul's, occasionally brings him to church for Sunday worship. They always drive down Bittersweet Lane so he can see the house which holds so many memories for him.

Faith and family are the two most important pillars of Martin's life and he feels he has been richly blessed. And St. Paul is very blessed to have him as a member. .
